

SEN Information Report

These pages set out information about our provision for children and young people with special educational needs (SEN). They are updated annually.

About our school

Bladon School provides for children and young people with a wide range of special educational needs including those with:

- Communication and interaction needs;
this includes children who have speech language and communication difficulties including autistic spectrum conditions.
- Cognition and Learning needs;
this includes children who have learning difficulties and specific learning difficulties like dyslexia, dyspraxia and dyscalculia.
- Social, Emotional and Mental Health needs
- Sensory and/or Physical needs;
this includes children who have visual or hearing needs, or a physical disability that affects their learning

Our special educational needs co-ordinator (SENCo) is: Anne Perry.

How do we identify and give extra help to children and young people with SEN?

The school uses Oxfordshire County Council's guidance 'Identifying and supporting Special Educational Needs in Oxfordshire schools and settings'.

The guidance sets out:

- How we identify if a child or young person has a special educational need.
- How we assess children and plan for their special educational needs, and how we adapt our teaching.
- Ways in which we can adapt our school environment to meet each child's needs

- How we review progress and agree outcomes and involve you and your child in this.

How do we work with parents and children/young people?

We will always contact parents if we have a concern that a child or young person may have a special educational need.

We work closely with children and young people with SEN and their parents to agree outcomes and how we will all work towards these, and then to review progress. We do this in Pupil Profiles, which are reviewed three times a year with parents and children.

There are also opportunities for parents and children to contribute to our policies on SEN and Equality. We do this by including the school council in decisions about the school, and inviting parents to contribute via the suggestion box in the school office.

Adapting the curriculum

We offer a broad and balanced curriculum for all children and young people including those with SEN. Details are published on the school website. The way we adapt this for children with SEN and disabled children is set out in the School Accessibility Plan available here:

If a child needs 1:1 interventions for Literacy, teachers and teaching assistants may use programs such as the Wakefield Literacy and Language Scheme, Toe-by-toe, AcceleRead AcceleWrite, Bare Necessities or Reading for Meaning with the focus being on multisensory learning within a progressive program.

Maths interventions include Power of 1 and 2 by David Sharp for number skills and Maths No Problem based on the Singapore Maths approach using manipulatives and visuals for building secure number sense.

Social skills are nurtured within the whole school environment but in some cases extra support is needed so small group sessions can be arranged to address these needs using programs such as Spirals.

What expertise can we offer?

Our SENCo has an MA in Education and has specialist training in Literacy Difficulties (PGCAEP). She is working towards the NASENCO qualification.

All staff have completed TeamTeach training.

Teaching assistants are trained to support the particular needs of the children they work with.

Our SEN governor is Kathryn Courts

We also have access to a range of specialist support services including

- Educational Psychology
- SENSS, who support children with communication and language, sensory needs and physical needs
- Behaviour Support through the Northern House outreach service
- Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS)
- Oxfordshire School Inclusion Team
- Therapy services
- Early Intervention
- Children's Social Care

We always discuss the involvement of specialist SEN services with parents first.

We also work with other services and organisations that are involved with a family, with the family's permission.

How do we know if SEN provision is effective?

The progress of all children/young people is tracked throughout the school through Integris and pupil progress meetings.

In addition for children/young people with SEN we regularly review progress towards agreed outcomes assessing whether the support that's been in place has made a difference and what we need to do next, using termly provision maps.

When we run special intervention programmes for groups of children we assess how successful they have been and use that information to decide on how best to run them in the future using a range of assessments tailored to the interventions used.

Information about how the governing body evaluate the success of the education that is provided for pupils with SEN is contained in the governors' annual SEN report.

How are children and young people with SEN helped to access activities outside of the classroom?

All children and young people are included in activities and trips following risk assessments where needed and in accordance with duties under the Equalities Act 2010. We talk to parents and young people when planning trips so that everyone is clear about what will happen.

What do we do to support the wellbeing of children/young people with SEN?

All children have the opportunity to share their views through their school council representatives.

We listen to the views of children/young people with SEN by including them in reviews of their Pupil Profile.

We take bullying very seriously. We help to prevent bullying of children/young people with SEN by taking part in Anti-Bullying week, and training children in Year 6 as Anti-Bullying ambassadors.

Joining the school and moving on

We encourage all new children to visit the school before starting. For children/young people with SEN we familiarise ourselves with information from their previous setting and create a Pupil Profile for them based on their specific needs.

We begin to prepare young people for transition into the next stage of their education or training by making contact with their chosen secondary school and tailoring a transition program suited to their particular needs. We pass on relevant information to SENCOs at their new school.
