This document contains 6 A3 sheets, each of which presents an outline of the content of the new National Curriculum from 2014 Core subjects (**English, Maths & Science**) are presented in a year-by-year format, based on the outlines given in the National Curriculum. History is also presented in this format, based on a suggested programme.

All other subjects are presented in two-year sections, dividing KS2 into Lower and Upper Key Stages.

It should be noted that it is only statutorily required to cover each Key Stage's content by the end of the key stage. It is for schools to decide on the most appropriate ordering for their situation.

Curriculum Policy – Woodstock Partnership

The National Curriculum was revised in 2014 and the Woodstock Partnership Schools will all be adopting curriculum changes. All the schools will be making changes to their long term plans to ensure that all schools meet the requirements that are statutory. All schools have their own curriculum design and their own way of bringing alive the learning expectations.

English, Mathematics and Science form the core of all of the schools broad and balanced Curriculums. The expectations are ambitious and all of the schools within the partnership have a single most important outcome – ensuring their children are 'secondary ready'. What is distinctively important to all of the schools will influence a school's curriculum. Values, Church Links, Sports, Arts, Enterprising and Philosophy, amongst others, may all feature heavily in all of the Woodstock Partnerships Schools Curriculums.

Ongoing assessment will continue to play a crucial part of effective teaching and all the Partnership's schools will have a curriculum and assessment framework that meets the needs of the National Curriculum.

It is hoped that all the schools within the Woodstock Partnership can work collaboratively to devise a consistent and recognisable approach to assessment. This would support the secondary school (The Marlborough School) who are a pivotal part of the Partnership. The Woodstock Partnership Schools will all have a curriculum and assessment framework that meets a set of core principles and sets out steps so that pupils reach or exceed the end of key stage expectations in the new national curriculum;

- enables them to measure whether pupils are on track to meet end of key stage expectations;
- enables them to pinpoint the aspects of the curriculum in which pupils are falling behind, and recognise exceptional performance;
- supports teaching planning for all pupils; and
- enables them to report regularly to parents and, where pupils move to other schools, providing clear information about each pupils strengths, weaknesses and progress towards the end of key stage expectations.

The following document summarises exactly what is statutory in the Revised National Curriculum.

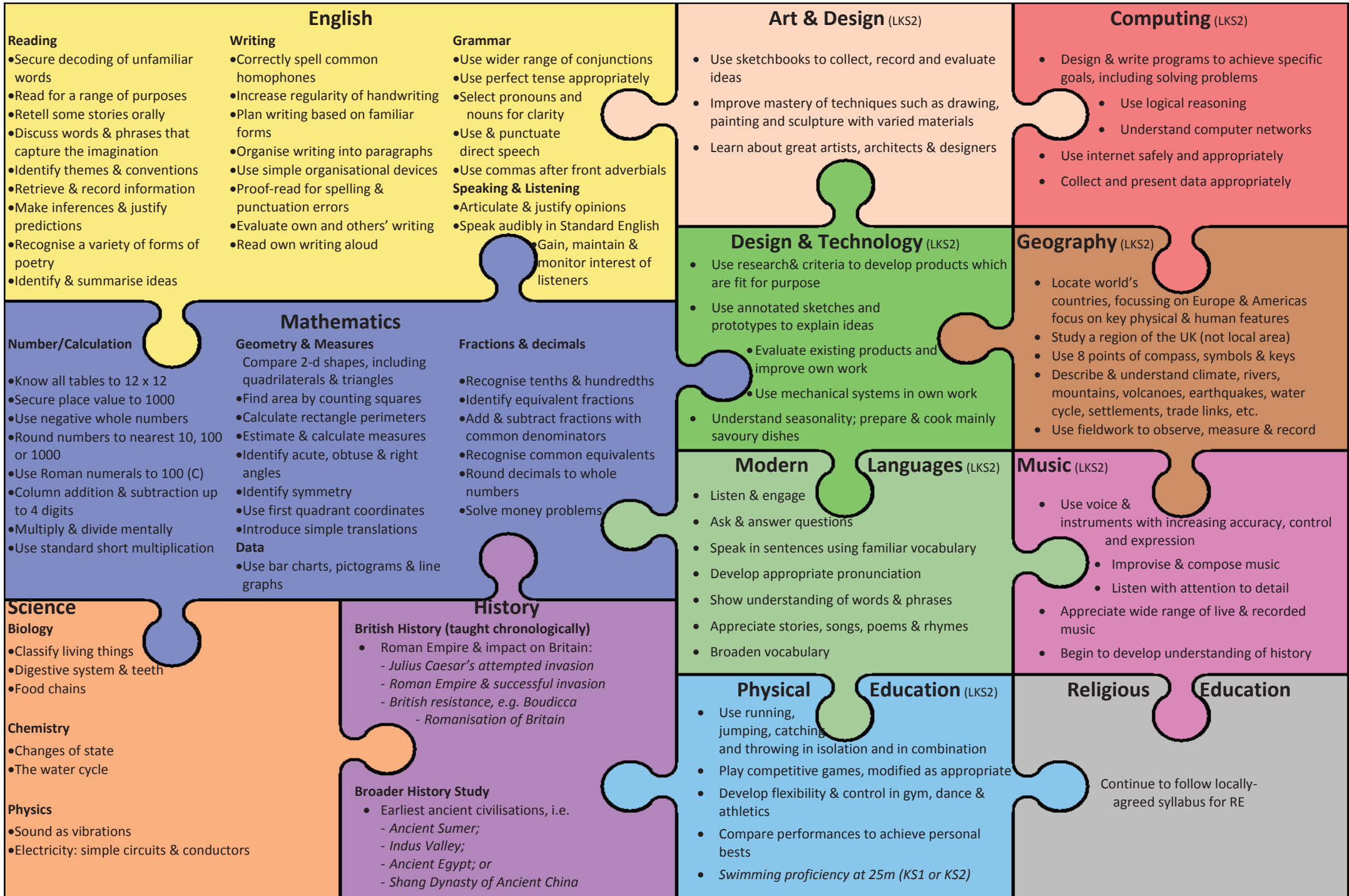
